# **Council Digest**

The Church Council met on December 19 for a fellowship meal as a council and their final meeting of 2024. A summary of reports and actions from the meetings not reported elsewhere in the Fortress follows: Ministrations A. Transfer In Morgan (Glowicki) Ritter from St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Jordan, MN Alex Ritter from St. Paul's Ev. Lutheran in Sodus, MI Joshua and Kimberly, Isaac, Erin Hanan from St.Stephen Lutheran Church, Adrian, MI **B.** Transfers Out Luke and Lydia, Eloise, Eden Gohl to St. Peter, Monticello, MN Mary Hoffman to Ascension Lutheran, Moorhead, MN C. Releases None reported In 2024, St. John's Lutheran Church focused on advancing financial stewardship and ministry planning initiatives. Transparency in financial reporting improved with bookkeeper Mike Thom creating standardized fund descriptions. A successful audit by Wayne Wels and Paul Willems confirmed the integrity of financial management. Budget adjustments included reduced hours for the Staff Minister, restructured K-12 Tuition Assistance, and a reallocation of Endowment and undesignated funds to support educational assistance. These changes underscore the congregation's commitment to fiscal responsibility and supporting Christian education. **Council Reports** The council spent some time reviewing the final

draft of the updated ministry plan. Some feedback from congregation members was integrated, so that there might be alignment with identified priorities and challenges. The plan includes a focus on budget realignment, fostering partnerships, and building on organizational strengths. The finalized plan will be presented for

adoption at the upcoming voters' meeting, providing a roadmap for the council. Deacon Brad Price made strides in improving ushering processes. Lead Usher Training and general Usher Training sessions are being planned for the first quarter, addressing basic duties, medical response protocols, and crew inconsistencies. These efforts reflect the deacon's and other boards' focus on creating a welcoming and well-prepared environment for worship services. Additionally, the deacon is working with the Elders to address volunteer shortages in ushering roles.

The Board of Youth and Education and Chairman Nick Schmoller celebrated a successful year for the youth group, with attendance exceeding expectations and events balancing service, fellowship, and spiritual growth. The board acknowledged the need for budgetary support for youth activities in future years to sustain this momentum. Bible classes and Sunday School operated smoothly, with special plans for the Sunday School Christmas Service on December 22. Collaboration with St. Paul's Lutheran School ensured a unified approach to educational and worship opportunities, a partnership that is a blessing from Jesus. Board of Evangelism (BoE) Chairman Jesse Zahrt and BoE members continued implementing goals aligned with the Strategic Ministry Plan. A prospect nurturing process was defined, and plans are underway to engage every member in outreach and fellowship. While Christmas banners were not displayed this year to balance aesthetic preferences, discussions on future banners and events will continue in 2025. Key upcoming events include the Winter Carnival on January 25, 2025.

The Board of Properties completed numerous maintenance projects, including pew tightening, door power washing, and a lead pipe check at the rental property. Recommendations for a deferred property maintenance fund and plans for sign restoration were presented. Challenges, such as addressing the *Continued on page 4*  fire sprinkler inspection failure, remain a focus for the board in the coming year. Collectively, these efforts ensure that St. John's facilities remain functional and welcoming for members and visitors.

**Council Business** 

The council thanked outgoing members and welcomed new members. Jacob Kral was also appointed to the Endowment Committee beginning in 2025.

The Board of Elders encouraged and highlighted the importance of council leaders attending weekly worship and Bible studies.

Additionally, the council reviewed the designation of the Endowment Fund to align with ministry goals.

The council made plans to share their annual reports with the congregation the Sundays before the next voters' meeting. The goal is that reports can be read before the meeting and voters can have time to organize questions and comments so that the most attention goes to the business on the agenda.

The next Church Council meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, January 21, at 7 pm.

The annual voters' meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, January 28, at 7 pm. Reports from the various officers, boards, and committees for this meeting will be shared with the congregation in the weeks ahead of the meeting.

## The Stewardship of God's Word

2 Corinthians 9:15 Thanks be to God for his indescribable gift! When we talk about stewardship, we often refer to the Three-T's: Time, Talent, and Treasure. And it is certain that we are stewards or managers of all these things. How we spend our time impacts our service in God's kingdom. How we use our talents reminds us that God gave us such abilities so that we might serve him with the natural and spiritual gifts he has given us. Also, when it comes to our treasures, we need to remember that every penny we spend is, after all, a spiritual decision when we ask ourselves, how can I use what God has blessed me with materially to further the work of Christ's kingdom and help others to know him better. However, more important than any other aspect of our stewardship in God's kingdom is the way we manage God's Word. The stewardship of God's Word must govern every other aspect of our Christian stewardship because that is what it is ultimately is based upon. When St. Paul wrote to the Corinthians about Christian giving, and was reminding them to be generous, he said: 2 Corinthians 9:11 You will be made rich in every way so that you can be generous on every occasion, and through us your generosity will result in thanksgiving to God. The interesting thing is that the word he used for generosity has nothing to do with the amount one gives. It literally means to be "singlesighted." He was encouraging them to give their offerings by looking first to Christ and all he has done for us by living a perfect life and by dying on the cross to redeem us from our sin with a payment we could never otherwise be able to afford. Christian generosity is an attitude of the heart, not merely the amount someone throws into the offering plate.

Now take a giant step backwards and ask, what is going to give me such a heart and attitude to have this kind of approach to Christian stewardship of time, talents, and treasure? The answer is God's Word. The gospel of Jesus Christ is what compels us to want to give to God our all and our best of everything we are and have. It is faith that is spawned and strengthened by the Holy Spirit who works through the message of God's grace and forgiveness that causes us to want to serve God with pure motives out love for our Savior, and not because we are coerced to do so. As St. Paul reminded the Corinthians of the stewardship of their material blessings in 2 Corinthians 9, he tied it all together with God's grace and blessings to us. All that we

never earned or deserved – the forgiveness of sins, peace with God, eternal life in heaven – he connected to our ability to give back to God all that really comes from him in the first place. He told them: Thanks be to God for his indescribable gift! Yes, our ability to give to God anything that is acceptable to him is all because Jesus bestowed of his grace, his undeserved love, his free gift unmerited by us.

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ, study God's Word and make regular use of your Bibles. Take advantage of Bible classes and worship services. The Word of God has never been so accessible as it is in our day and age. Do not take it for granted, but instead embrace it, enjoy it, and find your strength and comfort in it. No Christian has ever said on his or her deathbed that they were sorry for spending time in God's Word. Be good stewards of God's greatest blessing, and as a result, you will be blessed in the stewardship of all you do out of faith in him.

## **Building for Ministry**

The First of St. John's Two-Phase Building Program 2004 - 2005

#### **Growing Pains**

The decision to expand our church building comes slowly. When St. John's was first established in 1948, we were a basement church. Eighteen years later (1966) we built the sanctuary in which we worship today. Almost 40 years later, the current office/fellowship addition was added at a cost that exceeded \$1.2 million. God graciously blessed our decision to build in 2005, but it was a long process. The need for greater worship space became evident in the early 1990s. The only access for wheelchairs was the rather steep ramp to the north entrance of the sanctuary. Only street parking was available for worshippers. A more recent city ordinance required that when building began, we must provide one off-street parking place for every 6 worshippers. Sunday school classes and adult Bible classes had to compete for a place to meet. A church where a pastor's study was originally in his home or confined to a small sacristy now required offices for two pastors. There was no space to mingle after services. The brief time between our three Sunday services made our small narthex feel like Grand Central Station at rush hour. With the volume of published materials needed to support a growing congregation, the secretary hardly had room to turn around. Our problem? St. John's had been landlocked. The house next to the church (617 S. Washington) had been offered to the church by Mr. Wolf for \$20,000 many decades before we thought we needed it. We had managed to purchase the second house (615) and for several years our teacher's family lived there. The third house (609) had belonged to the Muetzels and then sold to the Tom Hartwig family. Both were members of St. John's. The fourth house (605), though not necessary for building, was critical in meeting our off-street parking requirements. Much as in the game of Monopoly, there could be no expansion without all four residences.

During the pastorates of Pastors Kolander and Bovee, our congregational leaders held meetings with as many St. John's members as possible to listen to their needs and answer questions. A building committee was formed. Among the ideas that were floated out were: Repositioning of the sanctuary: push out the north wall and place the altar in the area of the south wall. Before the turn of the millennium, an architect was hired to draw up an addition to the north of the church. However, the budget we offered did not allow him to propose a quality structure. Around 2002 we looked at relocation. We considered either rebuilding on a vacant site or adapting existing structures for church use. After an exhaustive search was made, we came up short. However, our gracious Lord stirred in us a new appreciation for the transcendent beauty and possibilities of what we had right here at 627 S. Washington. Early in 2002, Mr. Wolf was approached about the purchase of his house. He proposed that if we purchase a house on the north side of New Ulm for him, he would give us his. The price was almost six times the original offer he had made long ago. But it was gladly accepted. About that same time we learned that the fourth house was sold before we even knew it was on the market. However, our disappointment was short-lived. The following Sunday a new couple appeared at church. He introduced himself as Greg Tobison, a second career pastoral student at Martin Luther College who moved in just four houses down the block. He assured us that he was willing to sell it to the church upon completing his two years at MLC. A doxology went up to the Throne of Grace...if not in words, then certainly from our hearts. It was time to begin Building for Ministry! While we owned them, the Hartwig House and the Teacherage had "The Teacherage" at 615 S. Washington (Eventually all four houses were sold and moved to other locations) been used for Sunday school classrooms and other meetings. The Tobison house was used as the church office during excavation and construction.

# **Central Africa Medical** Mission

While today we have all national staff at our clinics, originally CAMM employed an American Nurse-in-Charge and an American Clinic Administrator in both Zambia and Malawi. The individuals who held these positions moved far away from their families and lived in Malawi and Zambia for three years or more. They helped lead the national staff and relayed communication on clinic operations back to the CAMM Stateside Committee, even though communication was slow due to limitations in phone and mail service, especially from our start in 1961 through the late 1990's. CAMM relied on the leadership and professional background of the American Nurse-in-Charge and American Clinic Administrator at each clinic to ensure the clinics ran smoothly, and their partnership was essential to the success of CAMM, especially in those early years. In 1994, the Lutheran Rural Health Centre in Zambia was turned over to national staff to run the clinic. The same followed for the Malawi staff in 2022. Where would CAMM be now without the knowledge, commitment and integrity of the Malawian and Zambian staff? CAMM relies on them to ensure devotions are held each morning and to treat each patient that arrives at our clinics with empathy and professionalism. The staff is the face of our clinics and through the love and compassion they share with each patient, they are reflections of God's compassion to them. The local pastors of the Lutheran Church of Central Africa are also key partners with CAMM, Follow us on Facebook as they have an important role to further develop the spiritual welfare of each staff member and patient. Finally, all of our supporters are key partners with CAMM. Schools, churches, and women's groups, including LWMS, help spread the word about the work of CAMM with even more individuals across the country. And this in turn has caused an outpouring of support, in the form of prayers, monetary donations,

assembling and mailing parcels to the clinics, and special projects such as a CAMM baby shower, chili potlucks, special mission Sundays, and school mission projects which help fund building projects and new vehicles. The CAMM Stateside Committee members are filled with gratitude when we see photos of these activities or learn of all the assistance that is being provided. Since CAMM is supported solely by donations, we would not be able to carry out our work without the partnership of all of you, our supporters. God has truly blessed the work of the Central Africa Medical Mission for over 60 years, beyond what we ever could have imagined. May He continue to use all of these partnerships to guide and bless our work in the future to provide Christ-centered health care and to share the Gospel with all those who come to the clinics. Have a blessed Christmas season as we celebrate
